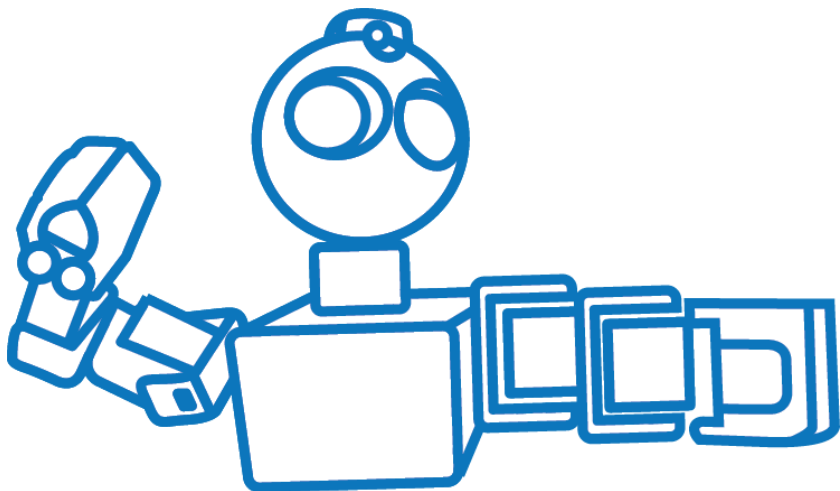

Implementing a STEAM Classroom Challenge

Understanding the Problem

Provide the goal of the challenge to the students. Have them identify the requirements as they breakdown the overall outcome into smaller objectives. At this stage of the process, students should be focused on defining and examining the problem, rather than focusing on how they will solve the problem.

An engineering log book is a great way to record student thoughts, ideas, and collaborations. Encourage both individuals and teams to express their design process through written, visual, and oral communication. This may include presentations, reports, tables, charts, discussions, predictions, or models.

Generating and Comparing Solutions

Encourage students to ideate individually before coming together as a team or large group. Each student should have the opportunity to share their potential solutions without judgement or criticism. Empower student collaboration by connecting a strong element or thought from each student to grow a group solution. Students can assess and critically analyze multiple potential solutions by weighing criteria such as time constraints, material restrictions, feasibility, and adherence to the requirements. Once a solution has been determined, students can then begin to develop a design plan.

Developing a Plan

Whether students are working as a team or individually, they will benefit from creating a design plan. This allows them to identify and schedule specific software or hardware tasks that need to be completed. Students should also predict anticipated areas of difficulty and identify any gaps in their knowledge that will require extra research or learning.

As they begin development, students should rotate roles to practice the various skills involved, from coding to connecting the hardware to recording design progress.

Prototyping a Solution

As students begin to develop their solution, they may benefit from first mapping out their proposed program on paper or by talking through the logic with another person or team. This will help them to develop their computational thinking skills as they gradually increase the complexity of their

implementation. Rather than implement multiple controls or commands at once, students should build their project modularly, iteratively developing and testing each component. Remind students to focus achieving the challenge outcomes as they innovate.

Testing and Refining the Result

Testing provides students with the opportunity to break and improve their designs. Verifying the outcomes of their work allows students to take responsibility for their own learning while considering practical scenarios that could impact their original plan. As students debug their designs, they will learn to recognize patterns in their code and the corresponding implications for robot movement or response.

Sharing the Final Solution

Challenges encourage creativity and innovation, leading to multiple solutions and varied results for every design problem. Students should have the opportunity to share their work while learning about the solutions of others. Whether this is done through a formal showcase or an informal discussion, students should be encouraged to consider how their final solution could be applied ethically and responsibly to a practical, real-world scenario.

Reflecting on the Challenge

Before ending the challenge, encourage students to reflect on the design process and the implications of their work. As they develop their technical skills, students will also benefit from growing their ability to self-assess and analyze. Identifying both positive and negative aspects of the challenge experience will help students to connect ideas in the future while building their confidence and competencies.

A program allows humans to give specific instructions to robots. Create a program in RoboScratch that uses the following elements:

- At least ten actions or movements
- A mix of “wait” and regular actions or sounds
- The robot must not remain in the same starting location
- The robot must take two different photos

- Implement delayed commands
- Move the robot
- Reposition the robot
- Output audio

Challenge – Obstacle Mission

Robots can enter situations that might be too dangerous or difficult for humans. They can navigate over rough terrain and around obstacles.

Travel through an obstacle course or through a maze within a specified time limit first using speech recognition to control movement, and then by creating a Blockly program.

Tip: Remember to calculate how many seconds it takes the robot to complete a 90-degree turn to the right or left.

Tip: Make a note of how far the robot moves forward in a single second.

Students will learn to...

- Adjust speech recognition confidence intervals
- Trigger movement through audio input
- Calculate and analyze robot movements
- Build a series of movement commands
- Navigate turns and obstacles

Challenge – Secret Message Delivery

Robots can process complex information such as QR codes and react to the provided information.

Generate a secret message in a QR code and swap with someone else. Program your robot to decode the new message and then read it out loud, starting with the phrase “The secret code is...”

Students will learn to...

- Store information in a QR code
- Detect a QR code
- Read information from a variable
- Append text to a string
- Output audio

Robots can be used to interact with humans. Some components, such as LED “eyes”, make them seem more approachable. “Eyes” can also be used to convey information to a human.

The objective of this challenge is to play a custom RGB animation when the robot recognizes a particular object. At least two different objects and two different RGB animations should be used.

Tip: Use logic to program a single tracking script for both objects.

Students will learn to...

- Create a custom RGB animation
- Train a new object
- Track an object
- Write a tracking-enabled script
- Implement if-else conditional logic

Challenge – So You Think Your Robot Can Dance

Robotics are used in fine arts as a part of performance, animation, and theatrics.

Design a custom robot dance routine to a favorite piece of music. The choreography must be at least one minute in length and use a minimum of five different positions. For an advanced challenge, create one custom action that can be incorporated into the choreography.

Once your dance is complete, create and share a mobile interface that allows anyone to showcase the dance routine.

Tip: Start with an existing mobile interface to see how buttons can be used to execute routines.

- Synchronize servo movements to music
- Save a new routine in the Soundboard control
- Transition between servo positions
- Advanced: build actions through still frames

- Modify or build a mobile app interface
- Save and export a mobile app to the EZ-Cloud

Getting Started with JD Humanoid

Getting Started with JD Humanoid

What does this section cover?

This section of the guide covers the content of **The Robot Program Episodes 001 – 003**. You will learn to build and connect the **JD Humanoid robot**.

What type of robot is JD?

JD is a humanoid (human-like features) robot that uses two legs for bipedal movement.

The **EZ-Bit** components of **JD** include:

- A **Humanoid Head** and **Humanoid Body**
- The **EZ-B Robot Controller**
- **Six Lever Servos** that act as motorized robot joints
- Two **Humanoid Feet** for bipedal movement
- Two **Grippers** that allow the robot to hold items

Wire Wraps will be used to organize the cables of the robot. The kit also contains the battery charging components and the **Getting Started Guide**.



What is the Getting Started Guide?

The **Getting Started Guide** gives an overview of important information. This guide also includes links to online resources, and contains a detailed diagram of the **EZ-B v4 Robot Controller**, which will be helpful for building the robot.

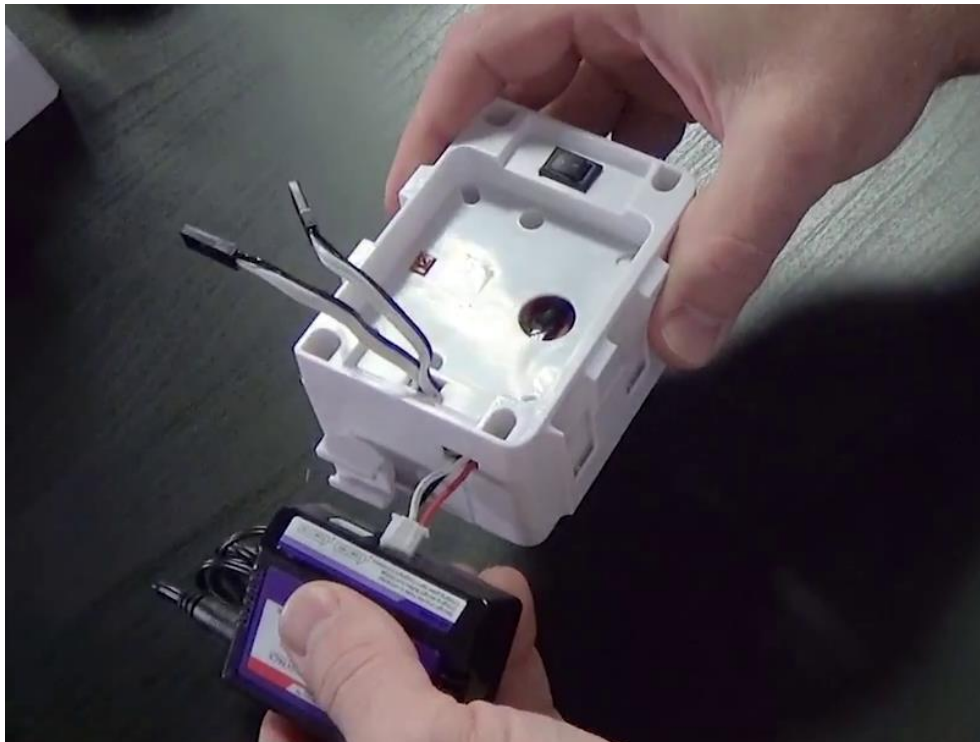
What do I need to know about charging JD?

Always charge the battery before using **JD**.

Use the appropriate country adapter and connect the transformer to the charger. The rechargeable robot battery is contained in the body, with only the charging cable visible. The **JD Humanoid** battery connection is under the left arm. Use your thumb and finger to securely connect the cable to the charger. To disconnect, gently rock the cable back and forth. Do not pull on the wires directly.

Each robot has a **Battery Saving Monitor** that will alert when the battery is low. Power off the robot and allow the battery to charge for a full cycle. The length of a full charge cycle varies, but may take a few hours. The charger has lights to indicate the battery's charging status.

Failing to charge may cause the battery to “puff up” and could potentially be dangerous. Dead batteries should be discarded according to local recycling and disposal rules.



What are EZ-Bits and how do I connect them?

The robot components are called **EZ-Bits**. Each **EZ-Bit** connects to the **EZ-B Robot Controller** using male-to-female connections at the back of the robot. The port layout can be viewed in the **Getting Started Guide**. Be sure to match the wire colors to the corresponding port colors. Adjust the cables so that they are coming out of the back of each **EZ-Bit**, which will make the connections easier to organize.

EZ-Robot Clip'n'Play Technology allows **EZ-Bits** to be connected using a simple pressure fit clip. Insert the male clip into the female side of the **EZ-Bit** and press together. To remove, reverse the process. If the fit is tight, gently wiggle or rock the **EZ-Bits** into place.

Treat your **EZ-Bits** with respect. Electronic components such as servos are vulnerable to heat, moisture, etc. Throughout building and use, ensure that no servos are making grinding noises or pushing against one another. Refer to the lessons for correct usage information.

Where do I find the building instructions?

The **EZ-Builder** software can be downloaded from www.ez-robot.com.

Verify that the software is from **EZ-Robot Inc.** Double-click to begin the installation. Choose **Typical** as the install type.

Read and agree to the **Terms of Use**. The introductory information can also be found in the **Getting Started Guide**.

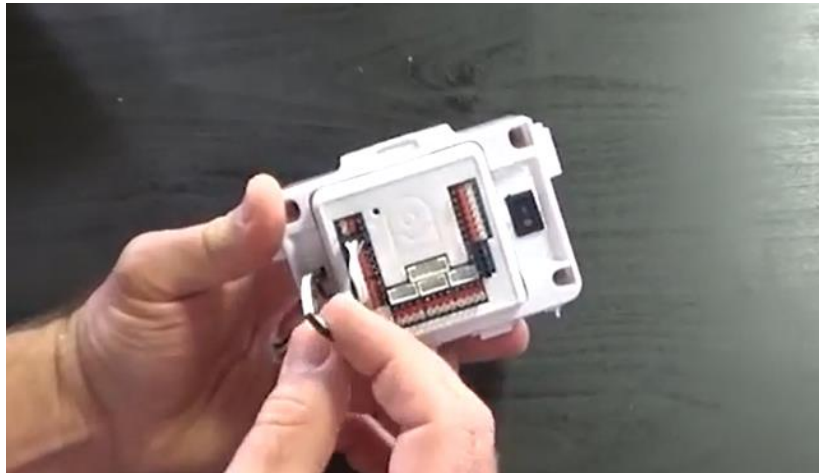
Login or create an **EZ-Cloud** account. More tutorials about **JD Humanoid** can be found at the **EZ-Robot School**. These tutorials also include related videos and lessons from **The Robot Program**.

EZ-Bits are robot parts. Sync to update the library for the most recent designs and information and select **Yes** to view the build instructions. Follow along with the step-by-step building instructions.

JD Humanoid Building Steps:

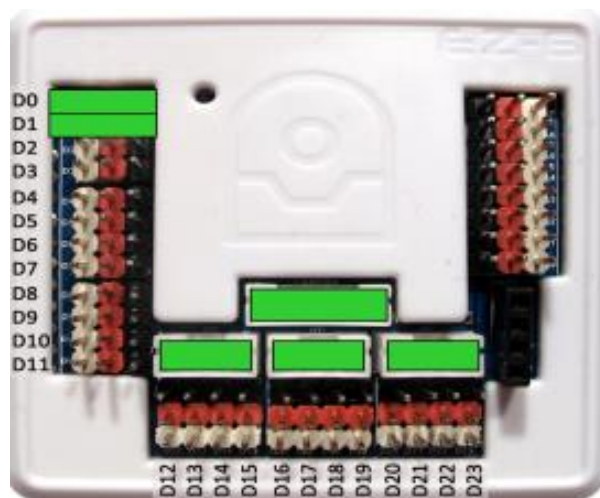
First, insert the **EZ-B Robot Controller** into the body. The cables use a male-to-female connection, with pins that fit securely into corresponding holes.

Connect the **Right Shoulder Servo** cable to **D2** and **Left Shoulder Servo** cable to **D3**. Match the black wire on the cable to the black side of the **EZ-B** port.



To begin building, **Clip'n'Play JD's Head Assembly** to the slot at the top of the humanoid body.

Connect the horizontal (left-to-right motion) servo to **D0**. Connect the vertical (up-and-down motion) servo to **D1**. Connect the **Camera** cable to the **camera port**. Connect the **RGB Eyes** cable to any of the **i2c ports**. Review the **Getting Started Guide** for a full diagram of the port configuration.

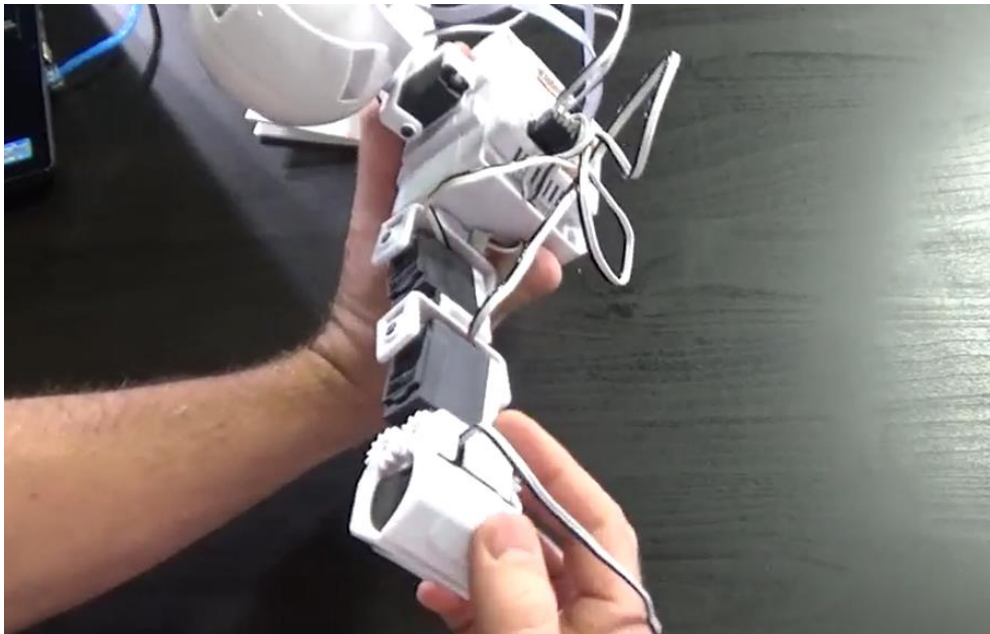


Rotate the left shoulder bracket to be vertically aligned, leaving the female slot open at the top of the bracket. **Clip'n'Play Left Upper Arm Servo** into the shoulder bracket with the white edge of the servo facing downwards. Connect the cable to D4.



Clip'n'Play Left Forearm Servo to the **Left Upper Arm Servo**. Connect the cable to D5.

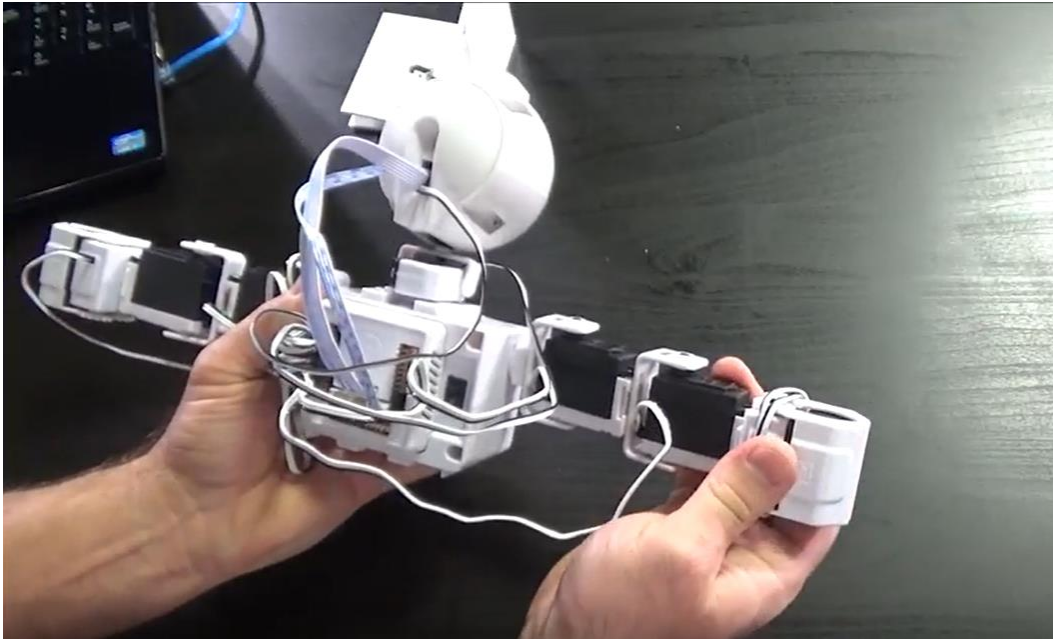
Clip'n'Play Left Gripper to the **Left Forearm Servo**. Connect the cable to D6.



Repeat for the arm arm. Rotate the right shoulder bracket to be vertically aligned. **Clip'n'Play Right Upper Arm Servo** into the shoulder bracket with white servo edge facing downwards. Connect cable to D7.

Clip'n'Play Right Forearm Servo to the **Right Upper Arm Servo**. Connect the cable to D8.

Clip'n'Play Right Gripper to the **Right Forearm Servo**. Connect the cable to D9.

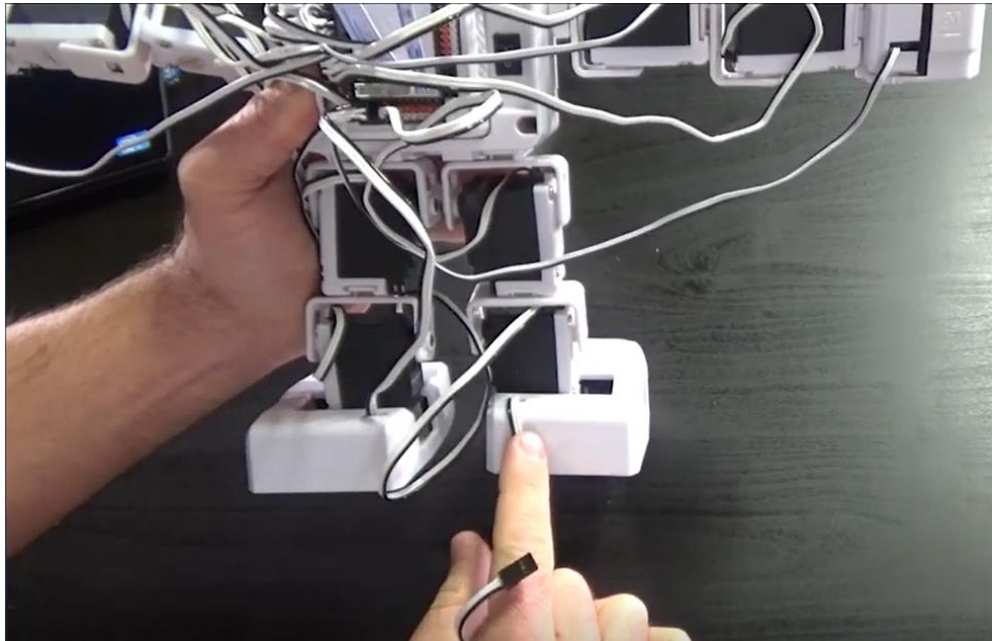


Clip'n'Play Left Upper Leg Servo with the white servo edge facing outwards. Connect the cable to D12.

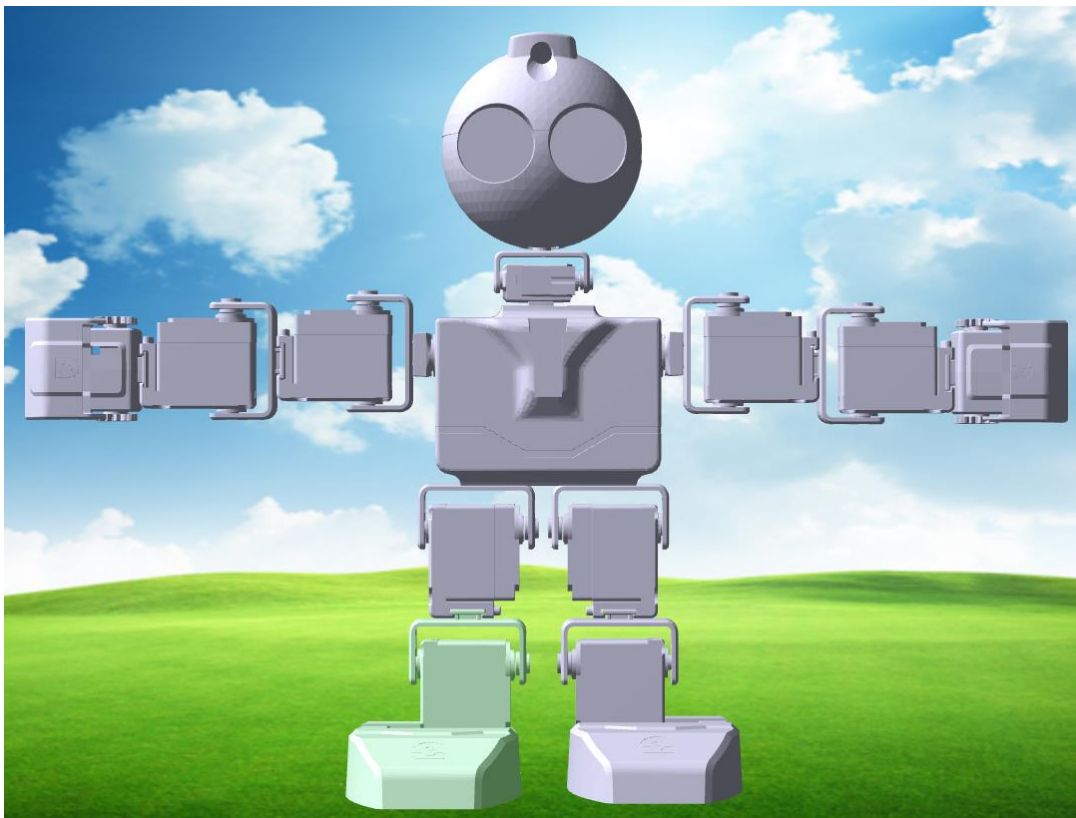
Clip'n'Play Left Foot Assembly to **Left Upper Leg Servo** with the white servo edge facing outwards. Connect the left knee servo cable to D13. Connect the left ankle servo cable to D14.

Clip'n'Play Right Upper Leg Servo with the white servo edge facing outwards. Connect the cable to D16.

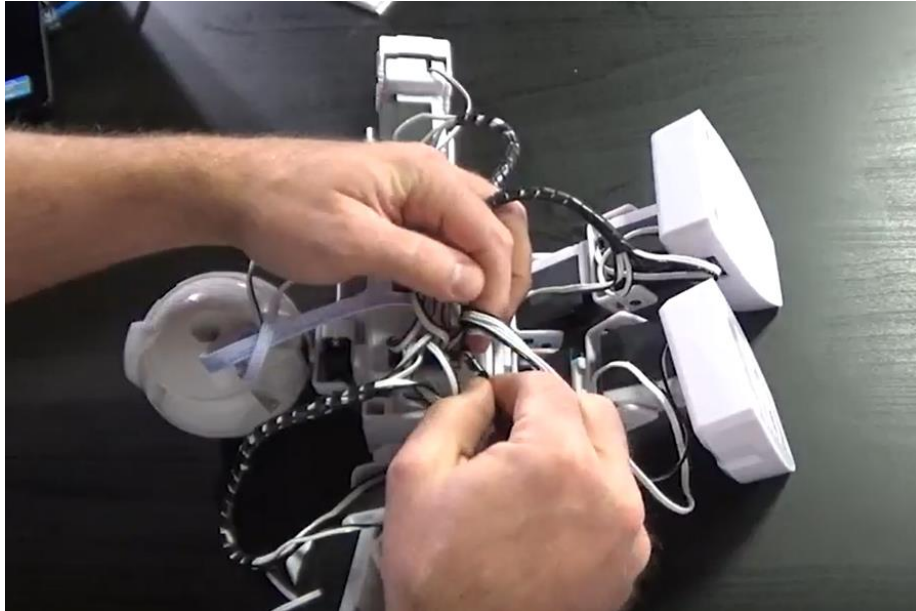
Clip'n'Play Right Foot Assembly to the **Right Upper Leg Servo** with the white servo edge facing outwards. Connect the right knee servo cable to D17. Connect the right ankle servo cable to D18.



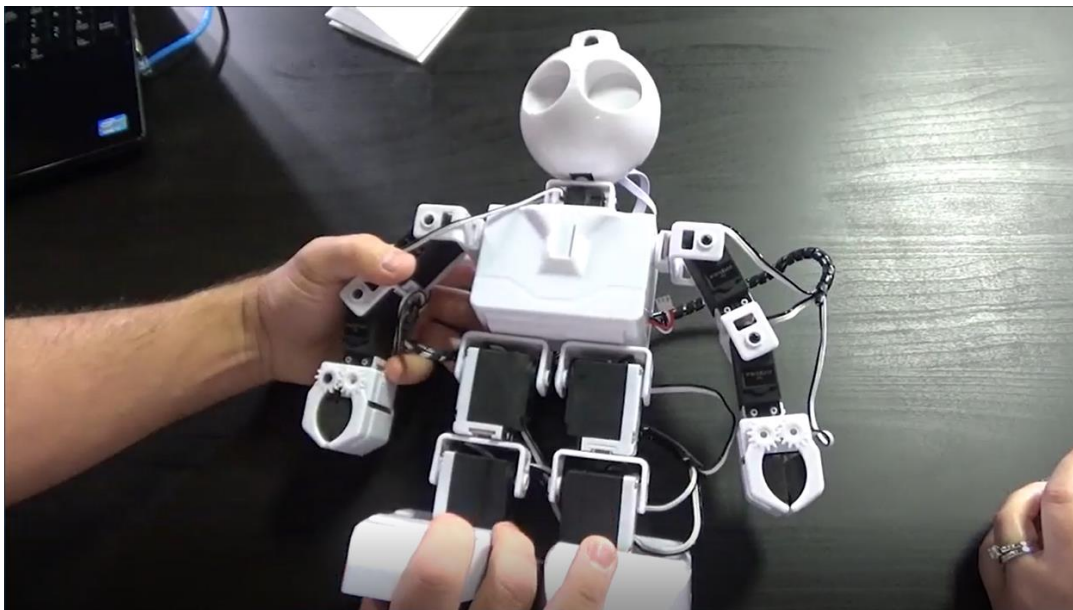
Check that the cable connections are color-matched to the ports and that the servos are correctly positioned. Use the 3D view buttons to check the build from all angles.



Use **Wire Wraps** to organize the cables. Leave cable slack near the servos for full range of motion. When wrapping the leg cables, begin the wire wrapping near the **EZ-B** and wrap downwards toward the leg servos. Test for full motion.



Your **JD Humanoid** is now complete!



How do I connect the robot to the software?

Always start working with a fully charged robot.

Open **EZ-Builder**. Select **Example Projects** and load the **JD** project. **Skip** the building instructions and servo profile prompts.

Select the **EZ-B v4** Wi-Fi connection.

Select Connect to **EZ-B**. The robot should move into the initialization position.

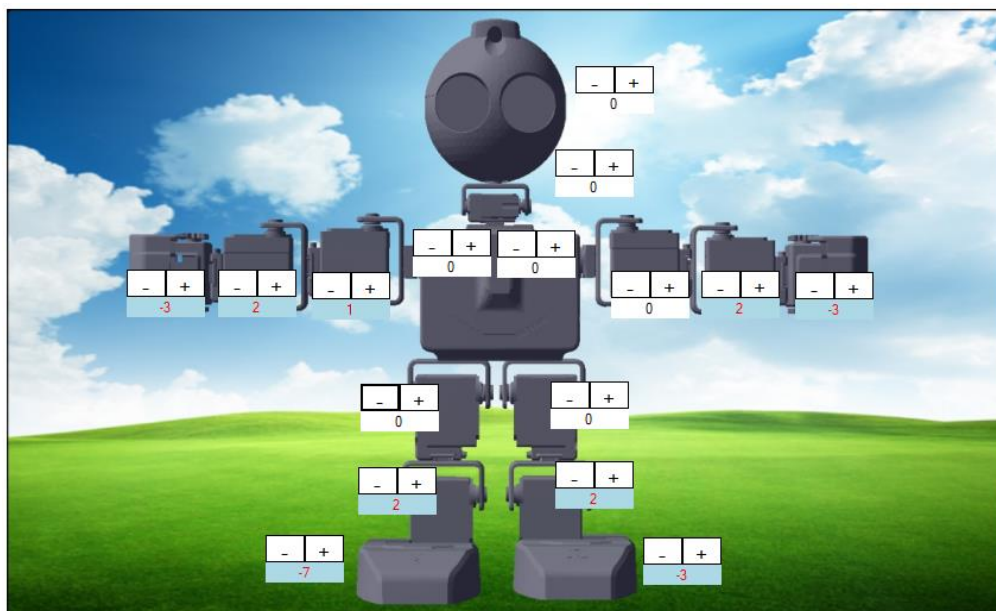
JD should now be connected to the software and ready for use.

What is a servo profile and do I need to create one?

JD Humanoid should be balanced and the aligned once connected to the software. Do not manually manipulate the servos when the robot is powered on.

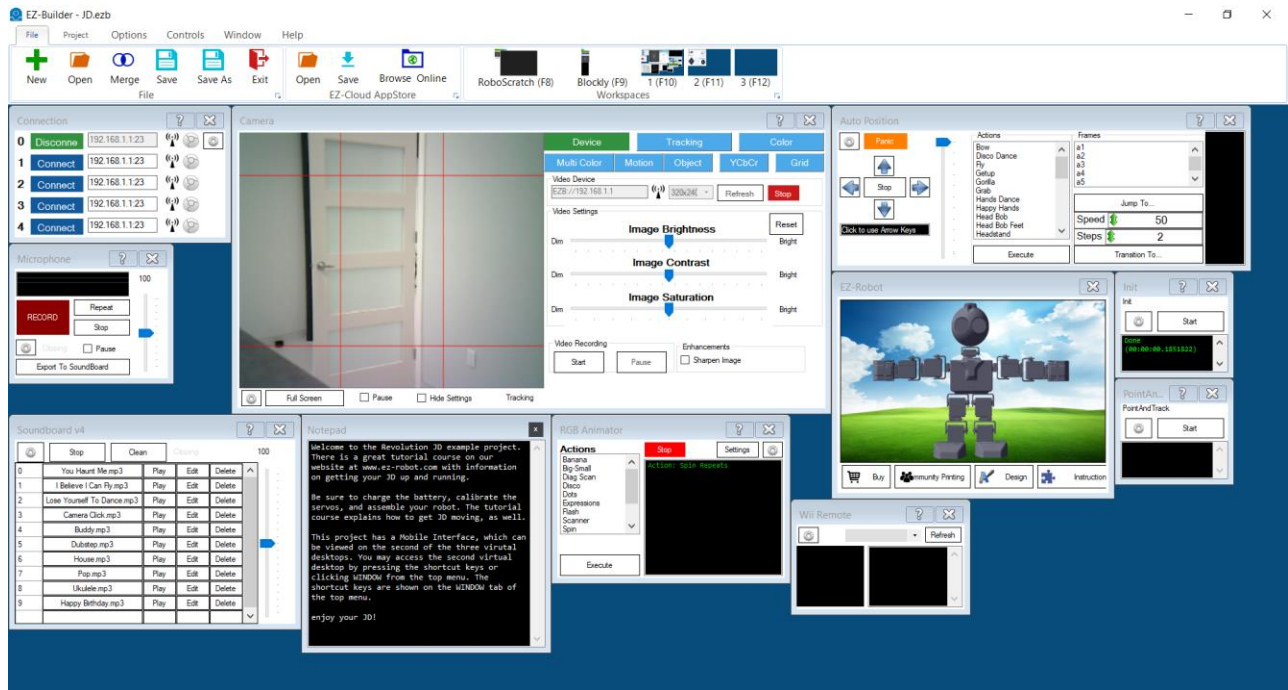
If the servos appear to be misaligned, they may need calibration to compensate for any slight hardware discrepancies. From **Project**, select **Configure** to create a new profile or **Load** to use an existing profile.

The servos of each arm and leg should be positioned in a straight line. Adjust the software servo values to line up each servo. Start with the servos closest to the body and move outwards. Adjust the servos of the head if needed. Adjust the leg servos as needed. **JD** should stand evenly on both feet. Once the servos are aligned, there should not be any grinding or vibrating noises. Click on **Save** and save the servo profile for future project use.



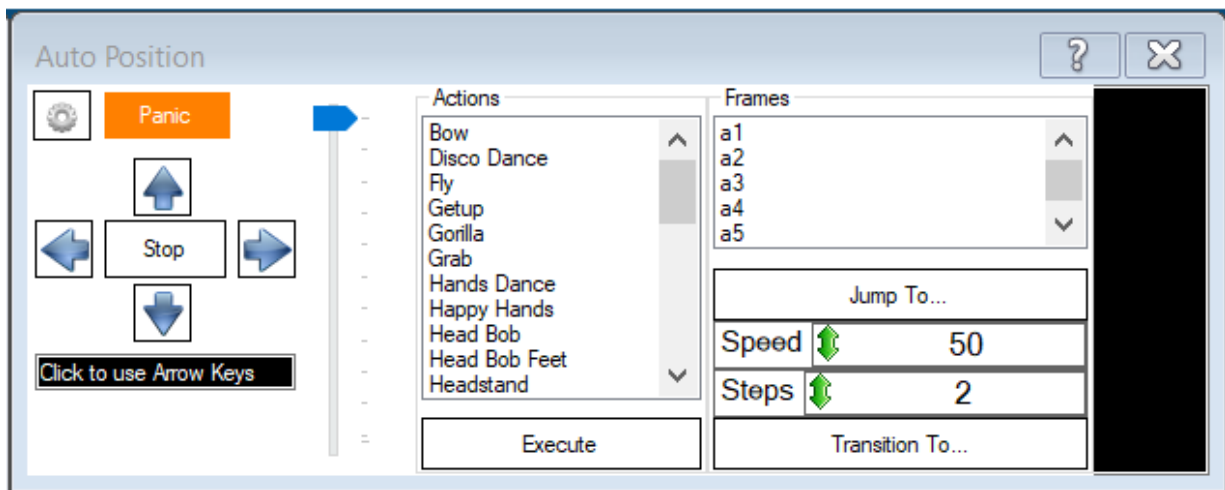
How do I get the robot to move?

There are many available controls in the **Example Project**.

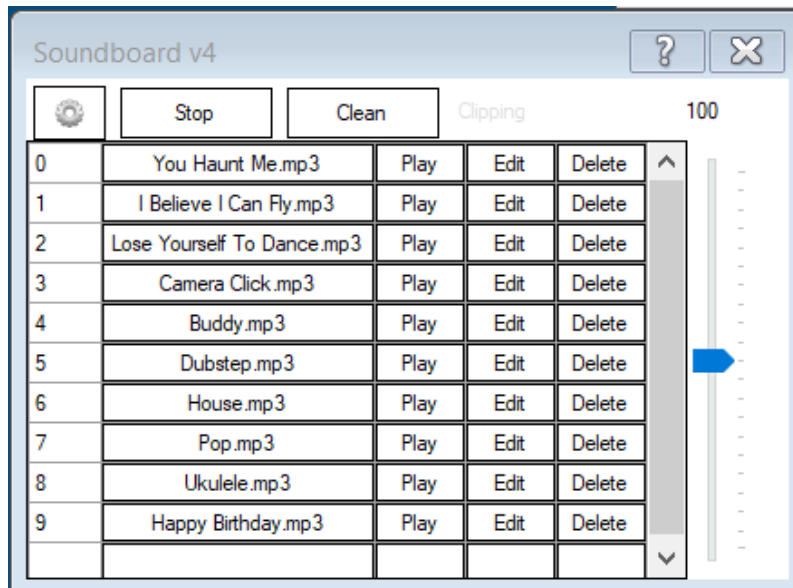


Scroll through the **Auto Position** actions to select the **Wave** command. Click the **Execute** button. JD should be waving his left arm. Try another one. Select **Headstand** from the **Auto Position** control and execute. Make sure JD has lots of room.

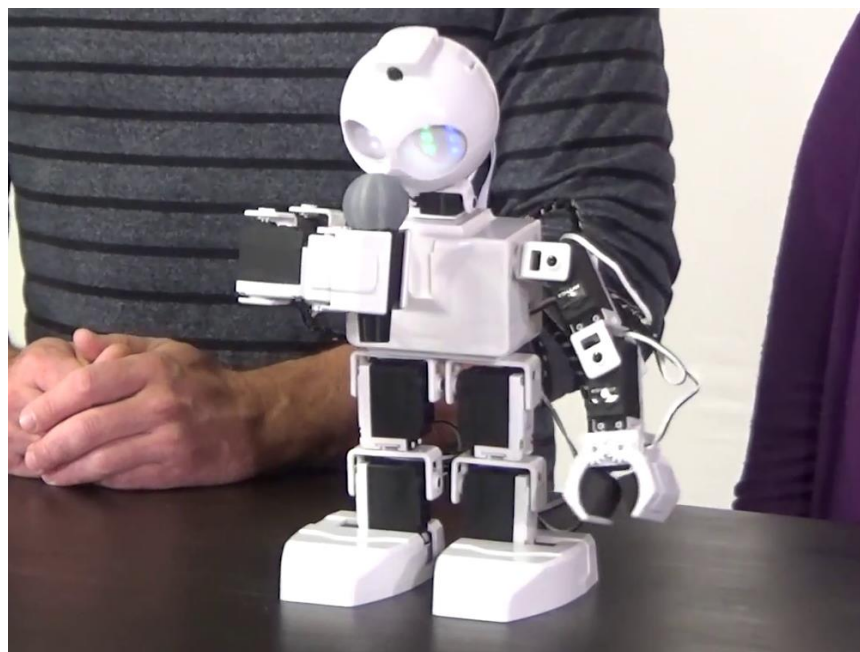
Control walking movement using the arrow keys.



Try executing another pre-built command. In the **Soundboard** control, scroll to **I Believe I Can Fly** and select the **Play** button. Watch JD fly!



Last one! Choose **You Haunt Me** from the **Soundboard** to see JD perform a routine.



Continue to explore the available actions. Remember to disconnect, power off, and connect to the battery charger when finished.
